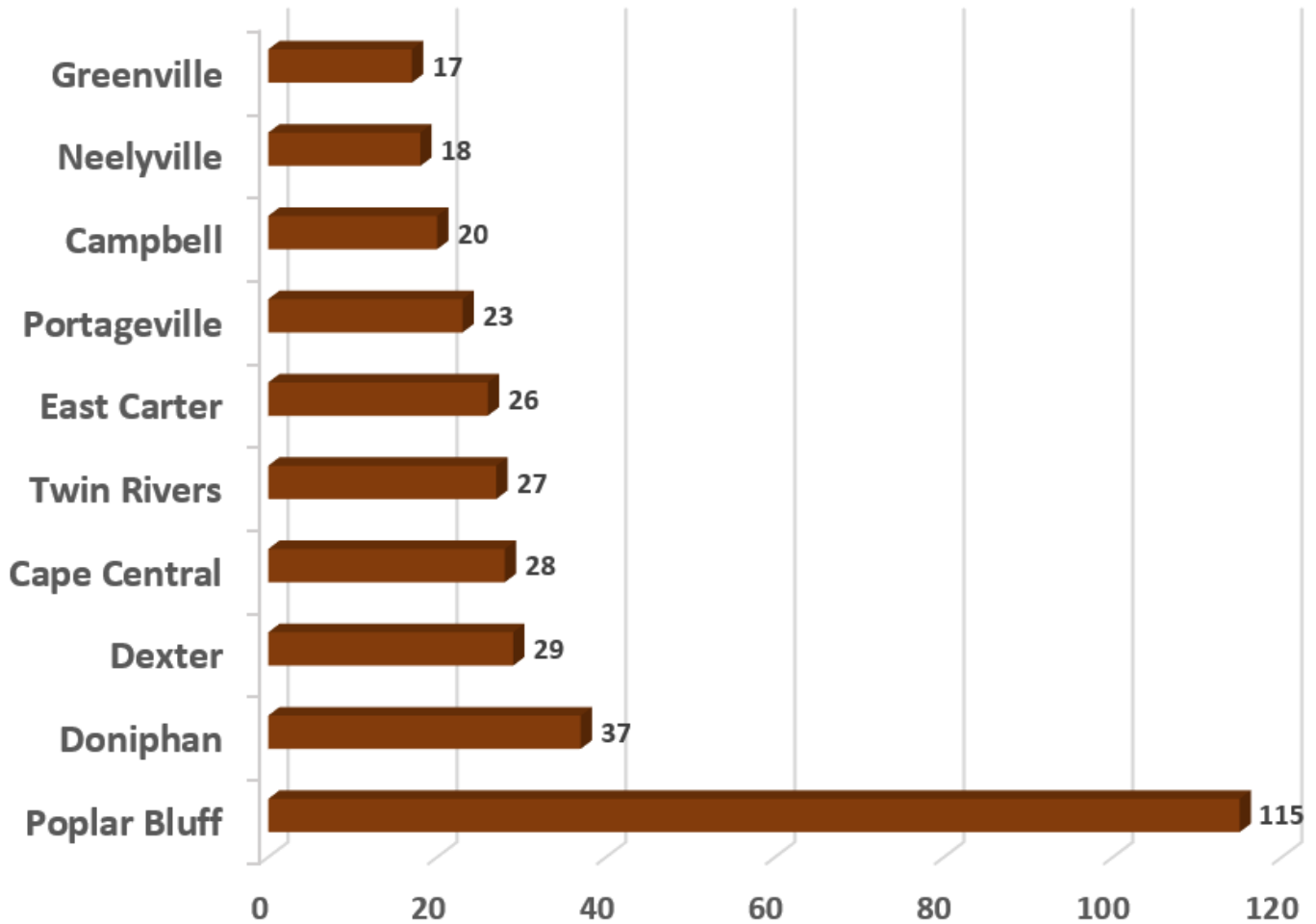

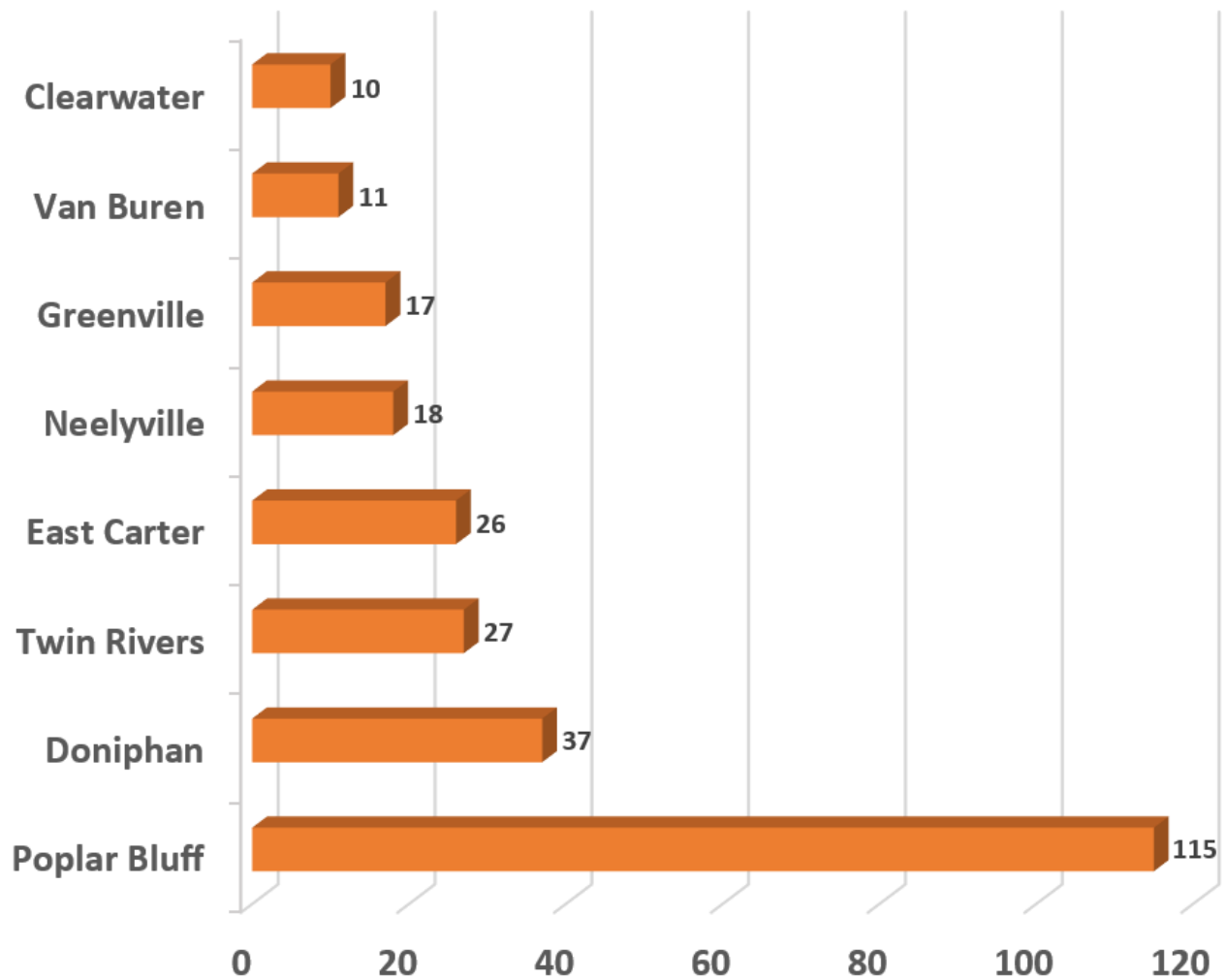
### Enrollment by Headcount

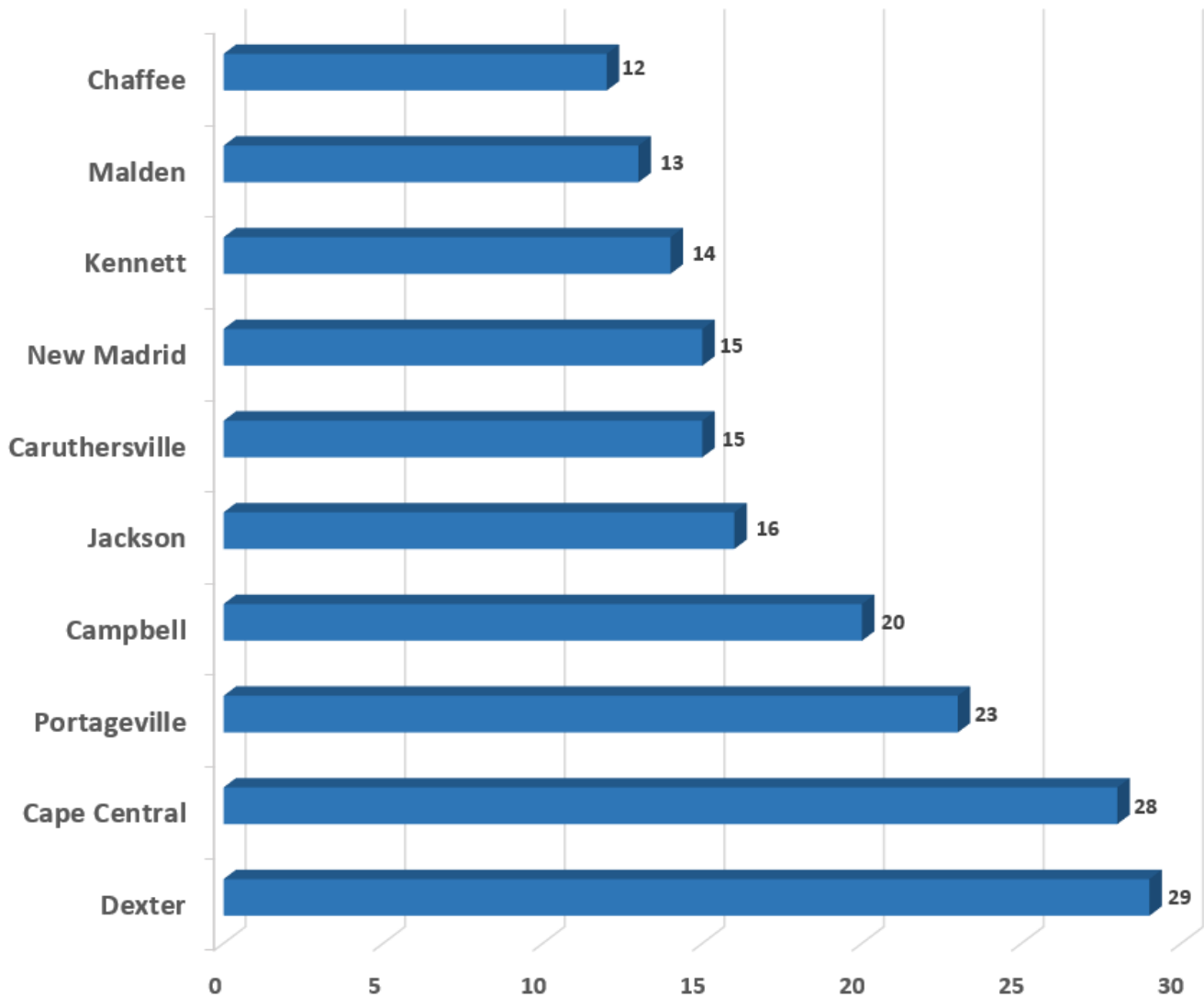

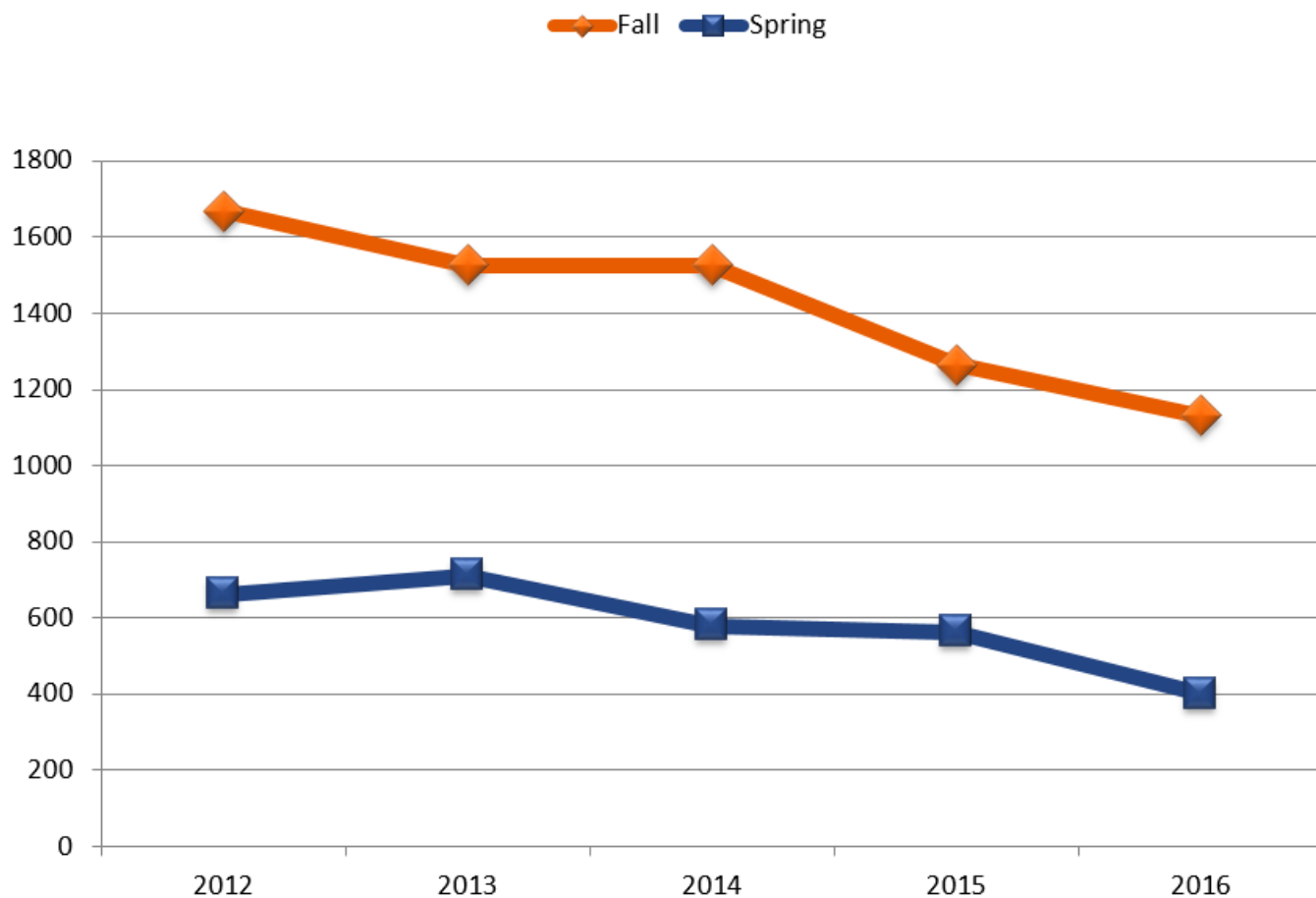

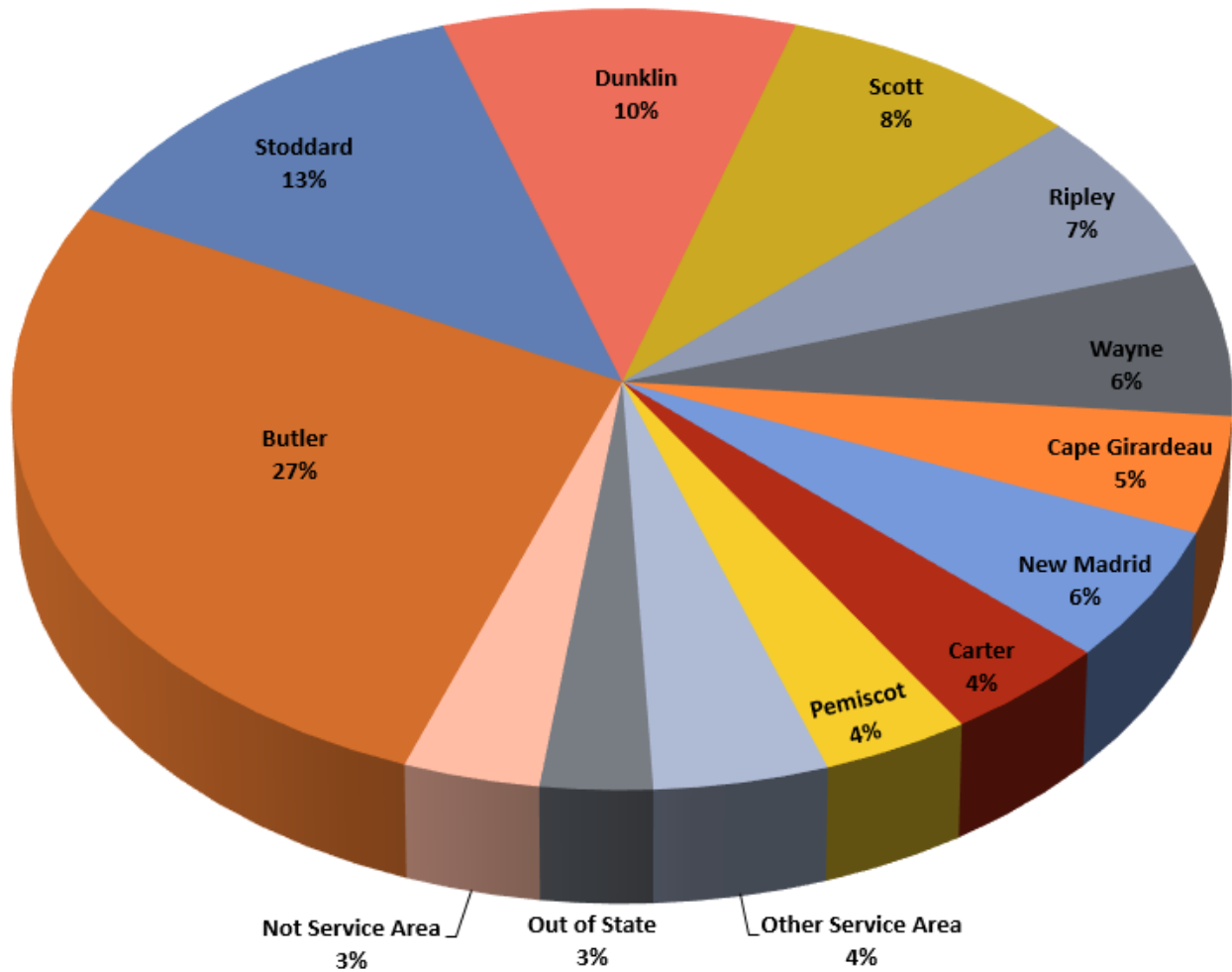
## NUMBER OF NEW STUDENTS BY TERM

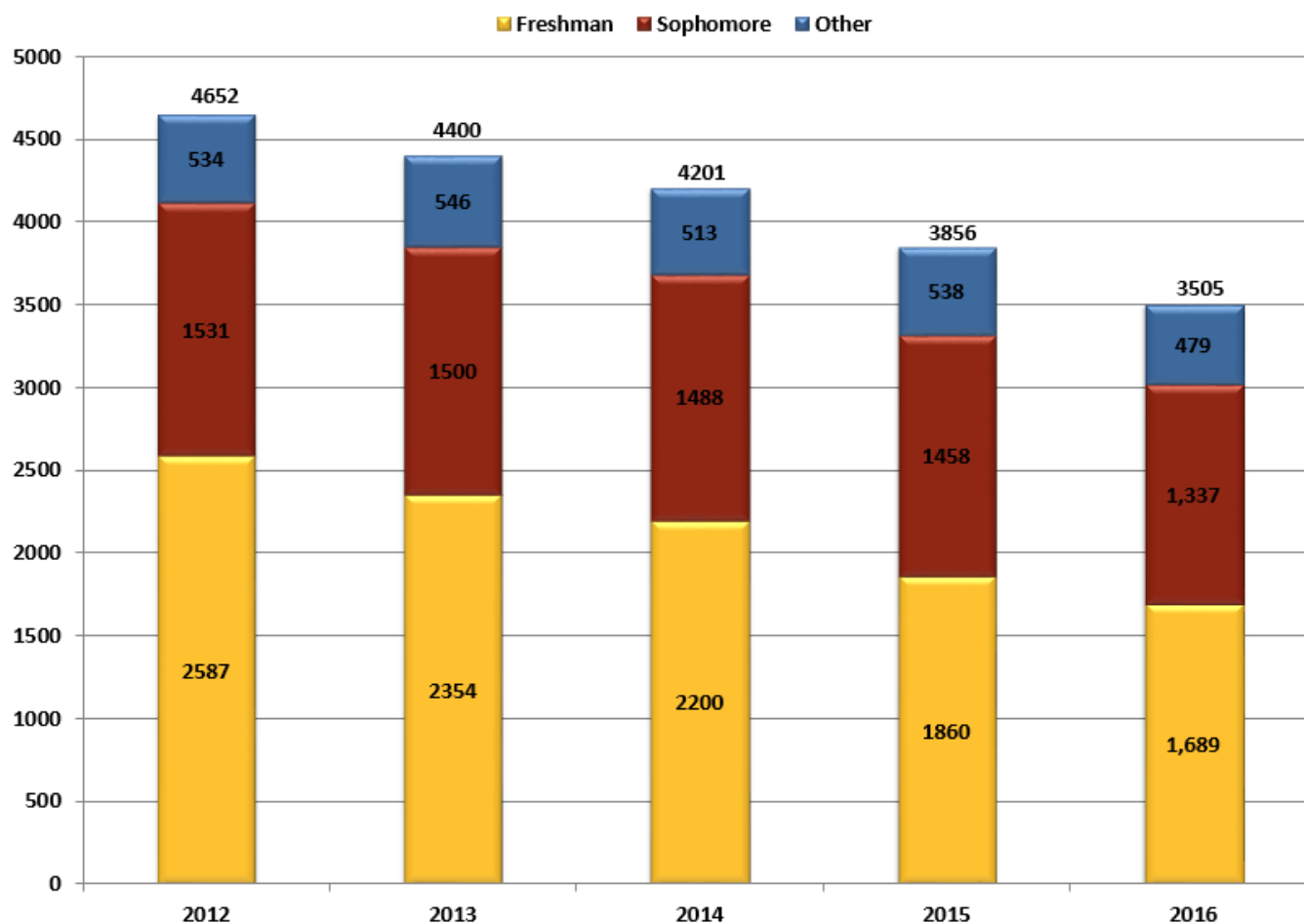

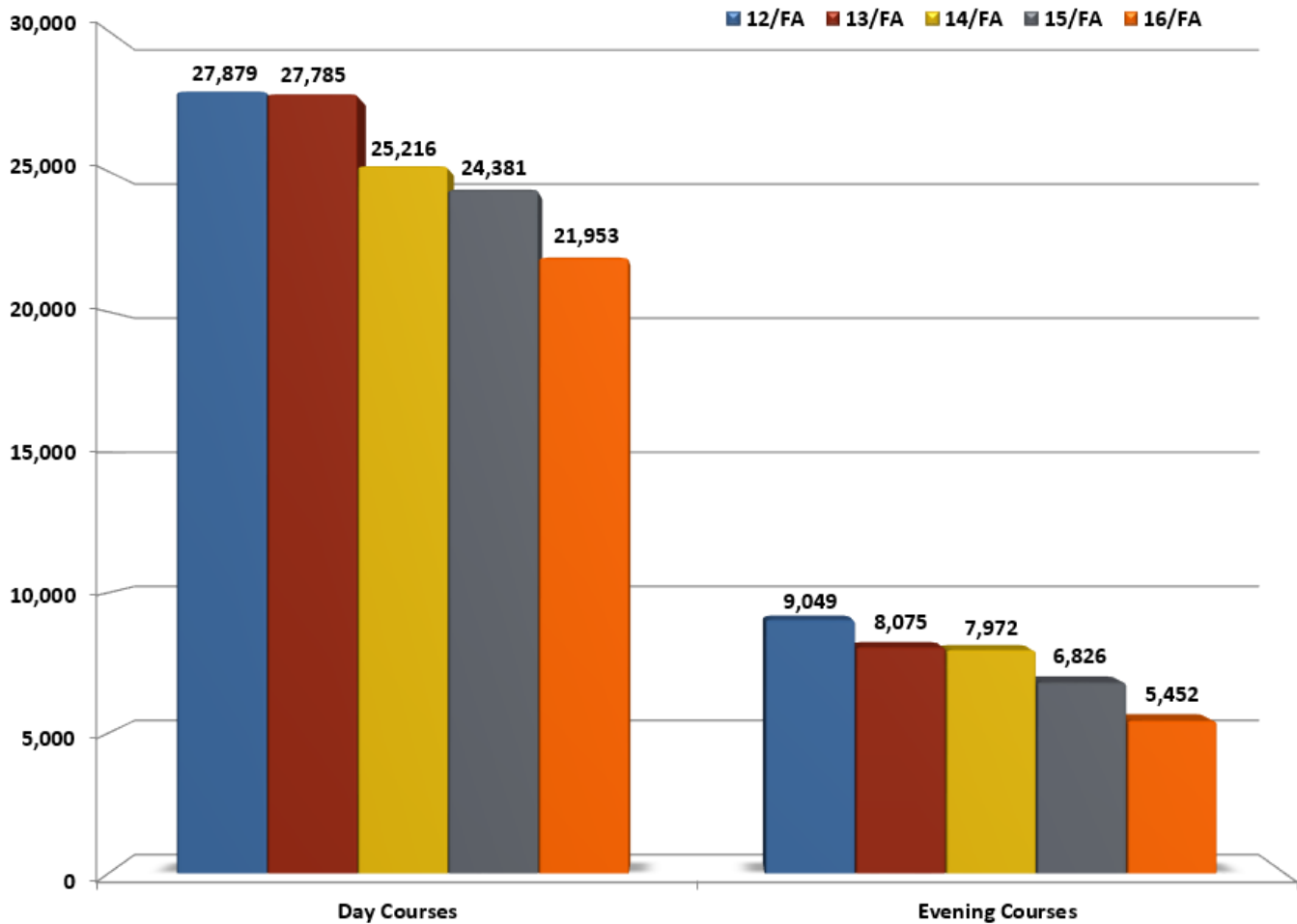

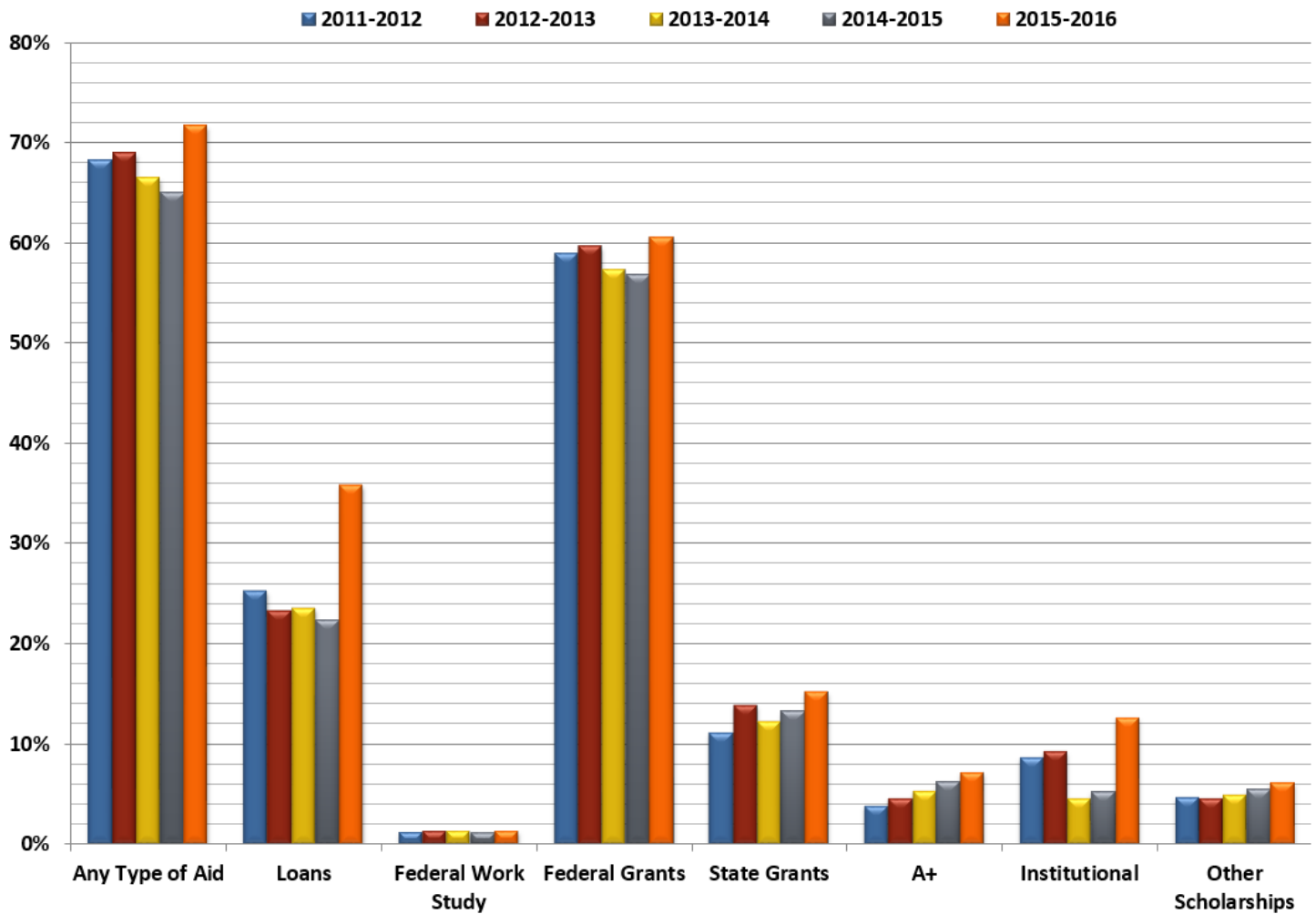

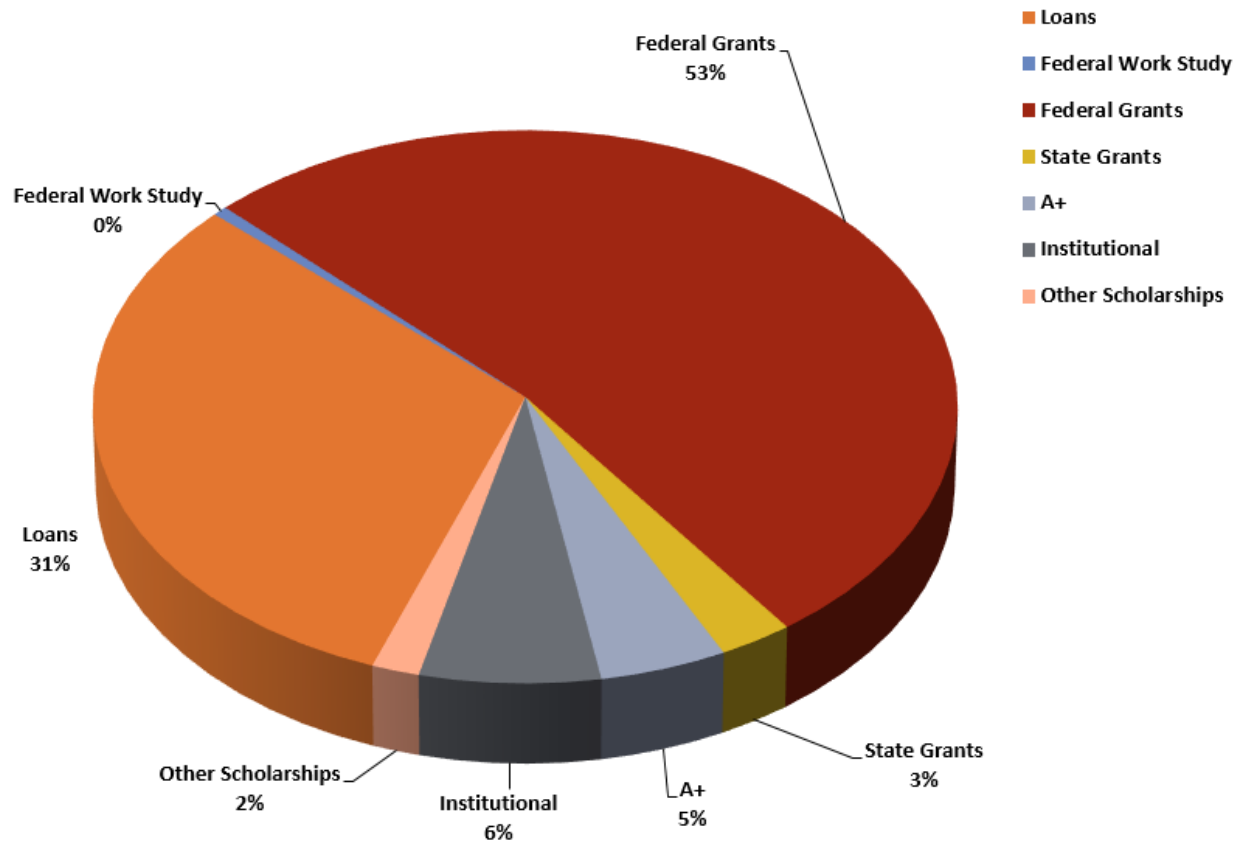

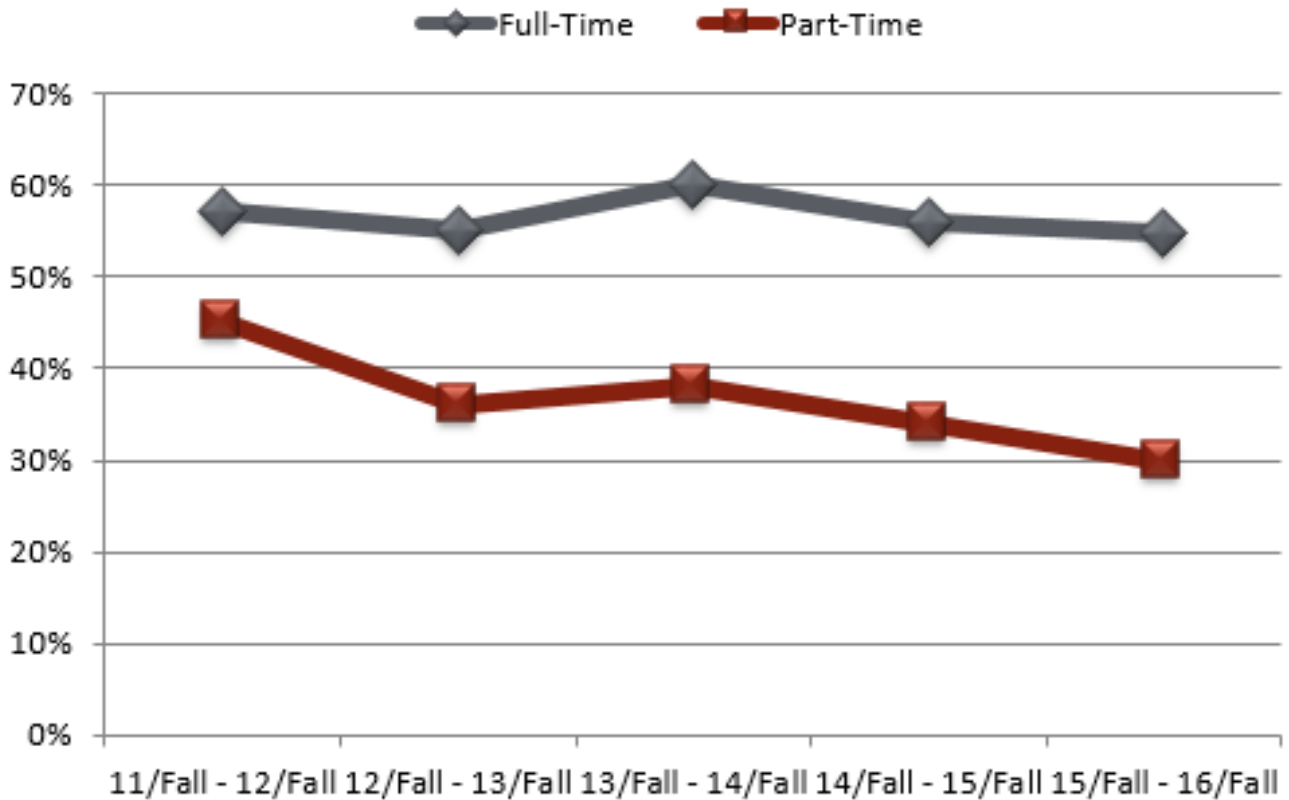
# FINANCIAL AID AWARDED

## FIRST –TIME STUDENT COHORT\*

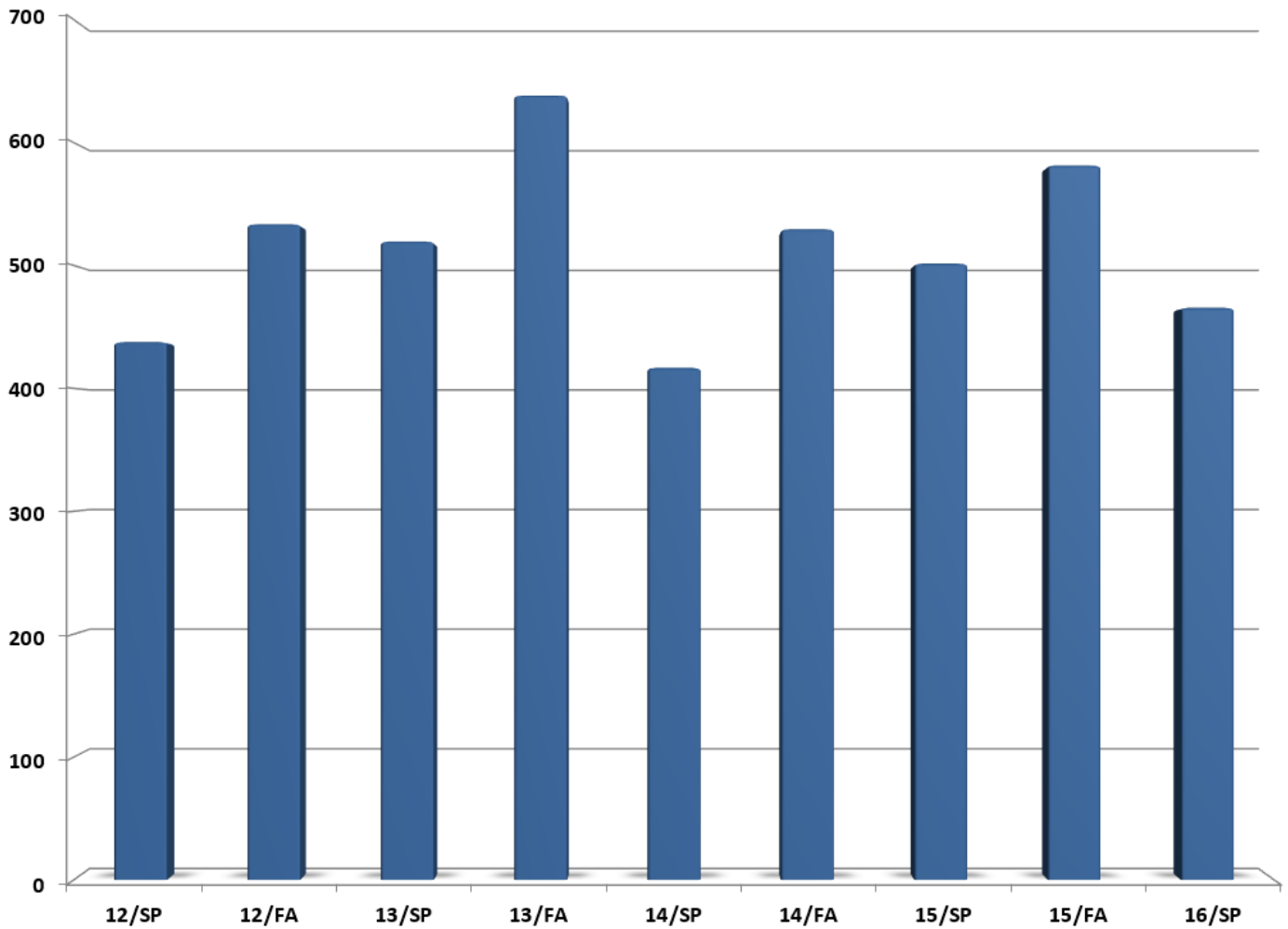

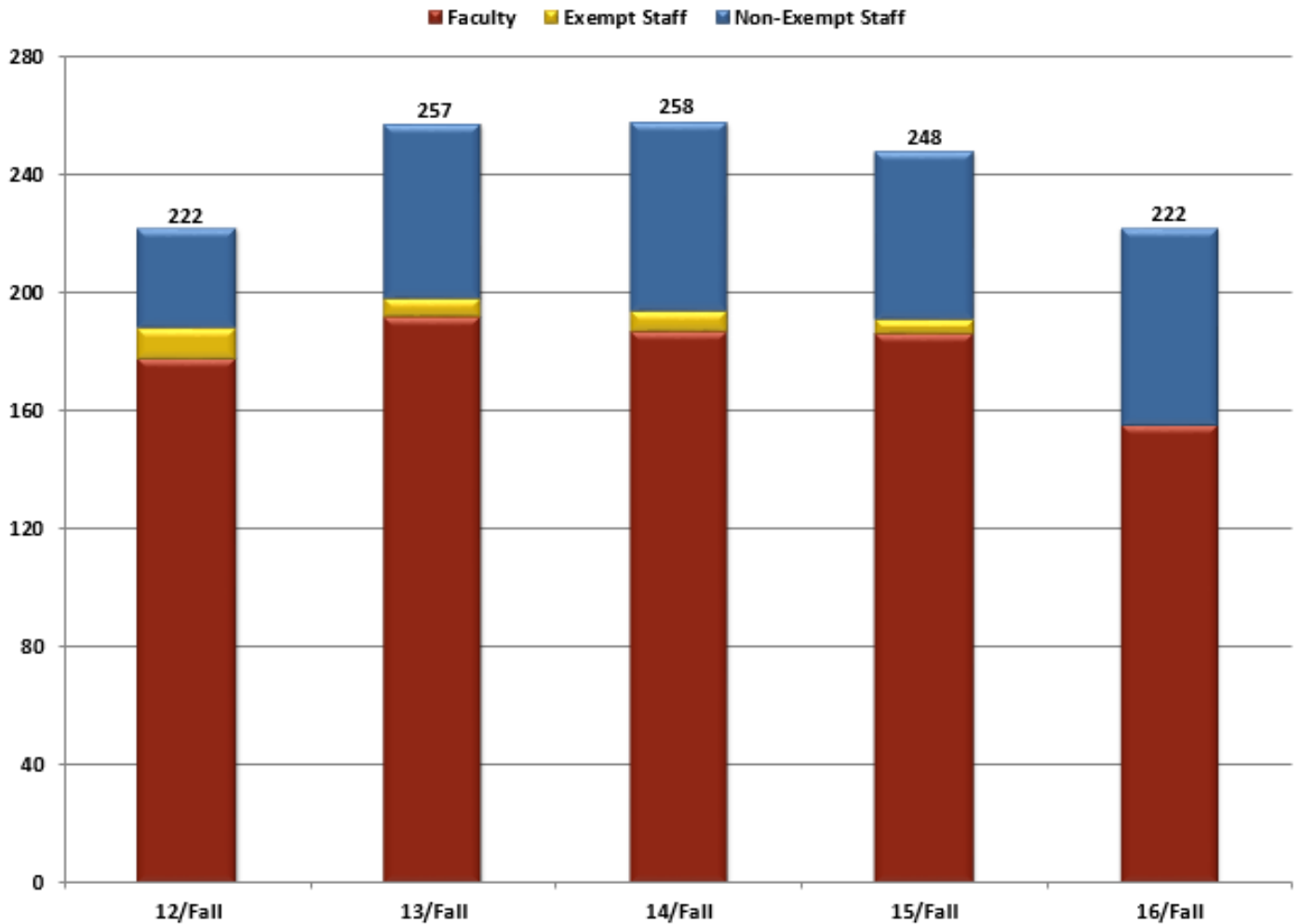

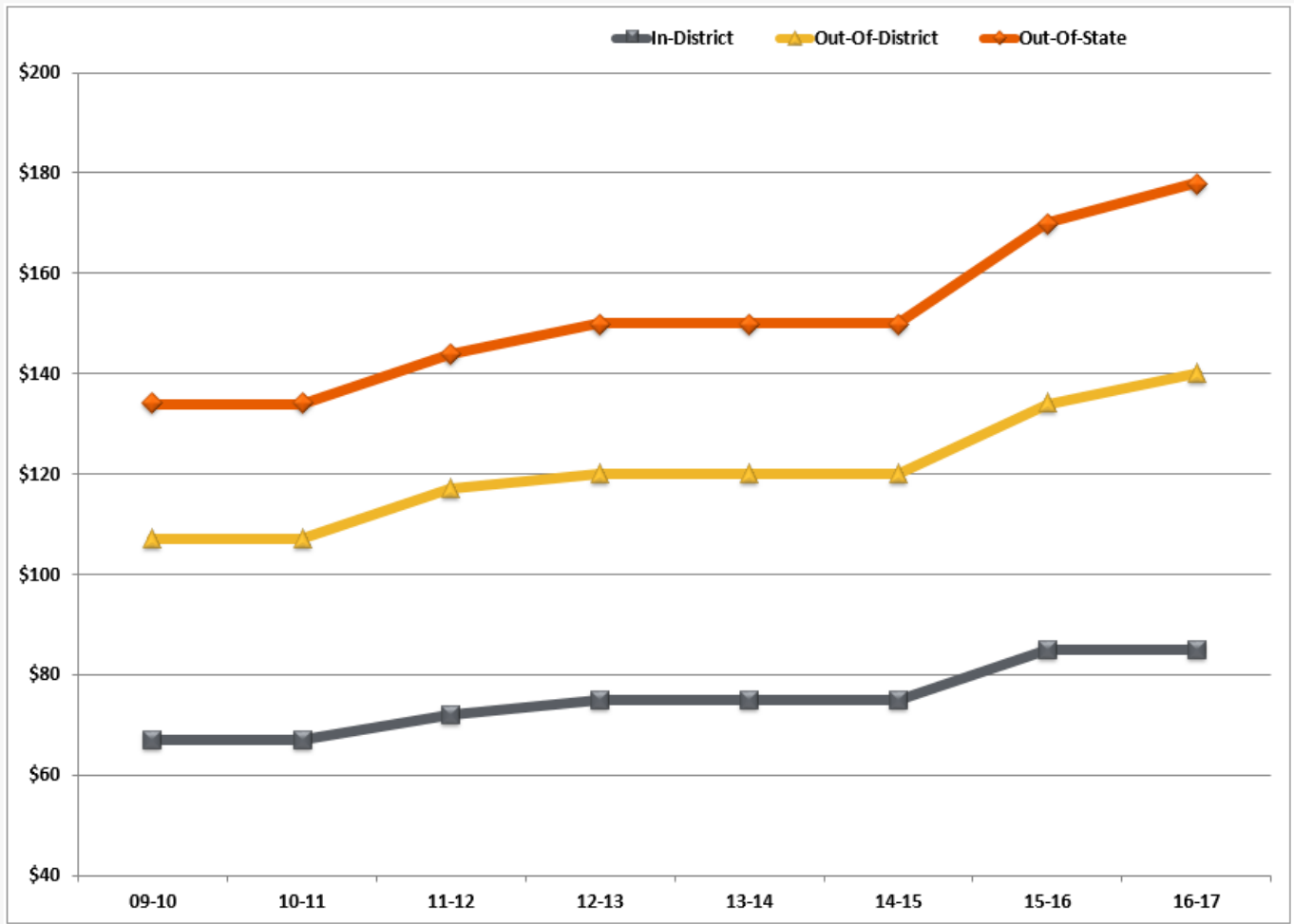

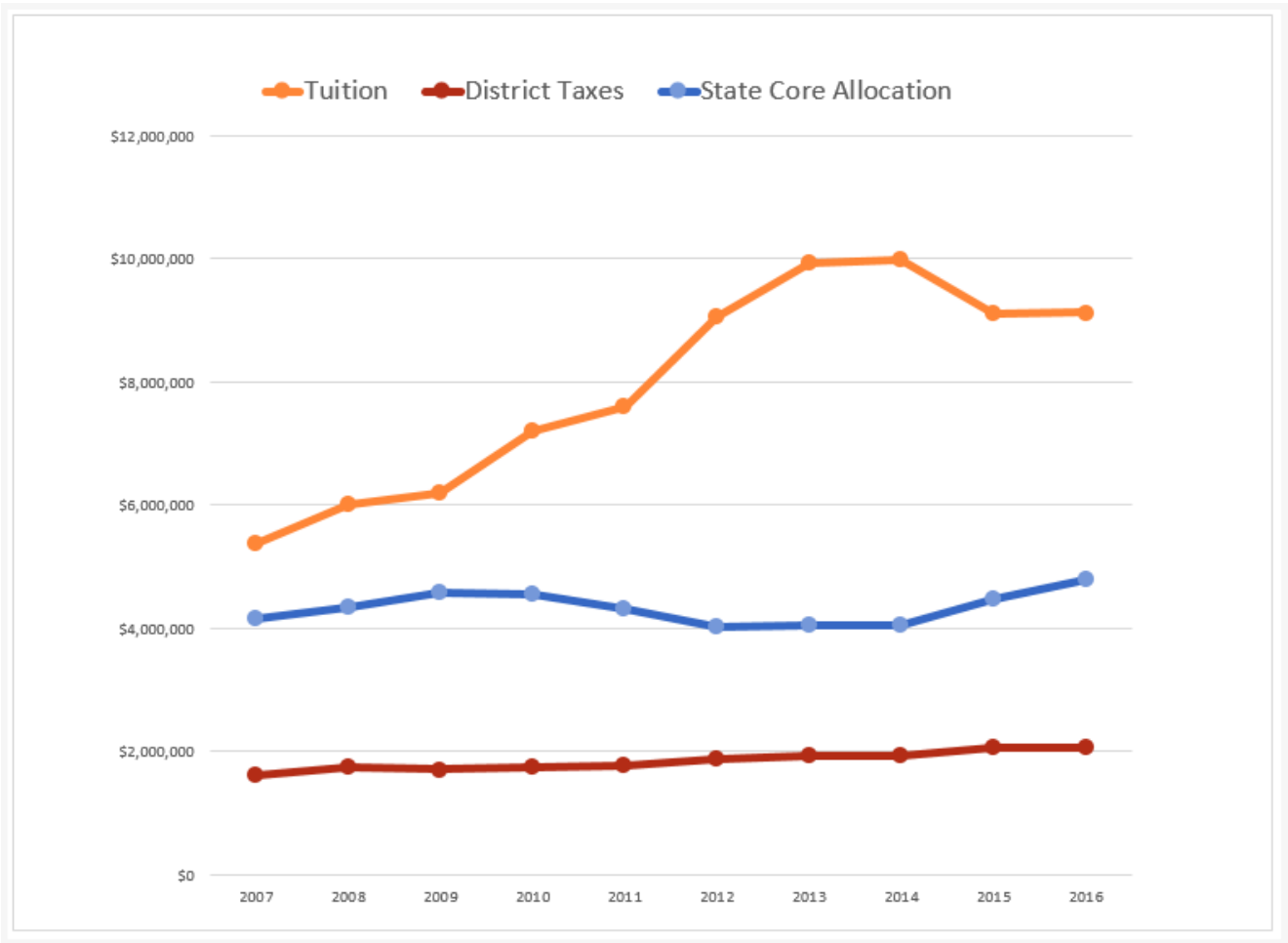
